

Mobile Food Pantries in Kinder, Oakdale and Oberlin served families with food distributions each month.

Partner Agency Programs provided 212,278 pounds of food to neighbors through food pantries, meal programs, shelters, and community services.





The Community Garden at Greater Hayes AME Church provided neighbors training and space to grow their own food.

SNAP Assistance helped **28 families** complete & submit applications for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (Food Stamps).
