

Food insecurity is defined as not having access to enough food for an active, healthy life. Louisiana ranks fourth in the nation for overall food insecurity, and first for food insecurity among children. Natchitoches Parish exceeds Louisiana state averages.

Mobile Food Pantries in Campti and Powhatan served families with distributions on the third Thursdays of each month.

Partner Agency Programs provided 449,241 pounds of food to neighbors through food pantries, meal programs, shelters, and community services.





Community Gardens at Natchitoches Council on Aging and the Ben D. Johnson Educational Center provided neighbors training and space to grow their own food.

SNAP Assistance was restricted to phone outreach that helped **6 families** complete & submit applications for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (Food Stamps).
